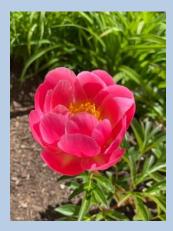

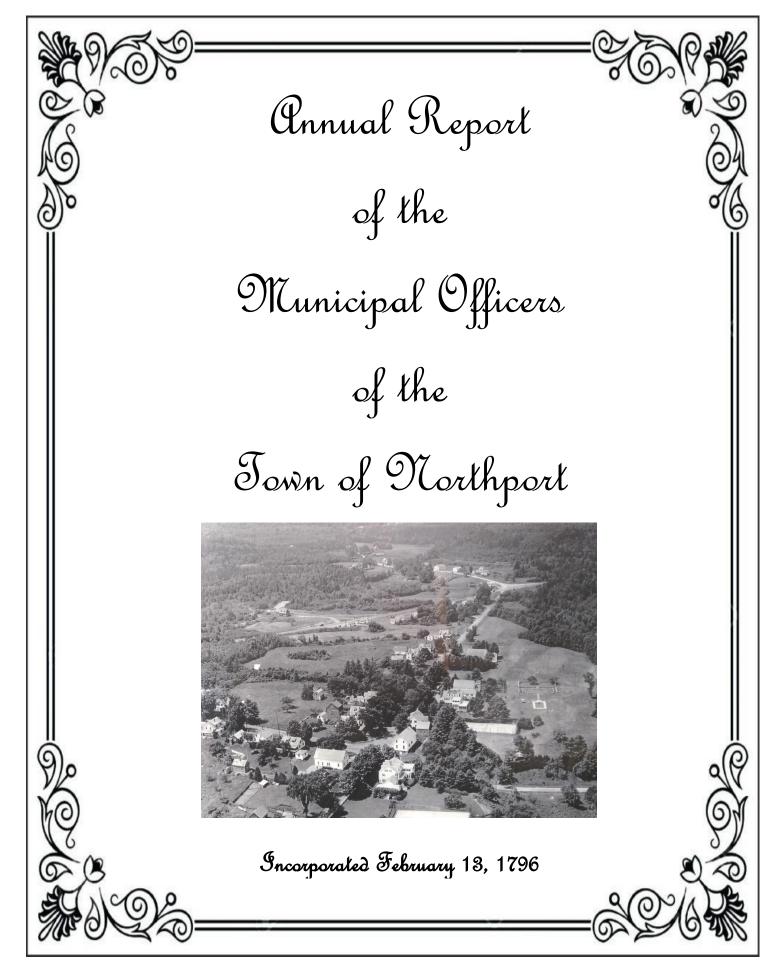

Dear Friends:

It is an honor to represent Maine in the United States Senate. I am grateful for the trust the people of our State have placed in me and welcome this opportunity to reflect on 2020, an incredibly challenging year for Maine families, small businesses, and communities.

When the pandemic struck, our country faced the specter of an overwhelmed health care system and devastation to our small businesses and the millions of people they employ. I immediately worked with Republicans and Democrats to pass multiple laws allocating approximately \$3 trillion to respond to this public health and economic crisis, including more than \$8 billion directed to Maine to support testing, schools, the economy, and other purposes — that is nearly double Maine's annual state budget.

I am especially proud of the bipartisan Paycheck Protection Program (PPP) I co-authored. This program has provided three out of four Maine small businesses with nearly \$2.3 billion in forgivable loans, which has helped sustain more than 250,000 Maine jobs. I have met thousands of Maine small employers and employees in all 16 counties who are surviving because of the PPP. As one small business owner told me, the PPP provided "exactly what we needed at exactly the right time." The PPP also allowed employers to maintain benefits, such as health care, during this challenging time. Another round of PPP is needed to sustain small businesses and their employees.

While the pandemic continues across Maine, our nation, and the world, I thank the first responders, health care professionals, teachers, grocery store employees, factory workers, farmers, truck drivers, postal employees, and so many others who continue to stay on the job during this difficult time. With the deployment of the first vaccines, better tests, and the incredible speed with which these life-saving responses were developed, I am hopeful we can emerge from this crisis in the next few months.

While providing relief to American families was my focus throughout 2020, other accomplishments include the passage of the Great American Outdoors Act, which provides full funding of the Land and Water Conservation Fund and addresses the maintenance backlog at our national parks, forests, and wildlife refuges. As Chairman of the Transportation Appropriations Subcommittee, in 2020 alone, I secured \$132 million to improve Maine's roads, bridges, airports, buses, rail, ferries, and seaports. Finally, as Chairman of the Aging Committee, I led the reauthorization of the Older Americans Act, which funds programs that improve the well-being, independence, and health of our nation's seniors and their caregivers, and I authored laws to reduce the cost of prescription drugs and protect individuals with Alzheimer's disease.

As the end of 2020 is approaching, I have cast more than 7,535 votes, never having missed one. In the New Year, my focus remains to work with colleagues to find common ground on policies to help support the health and safety of Mainers and the safe, responsible opening of our communities. If ever I or my staff can be of assistance to you, please do not hesitate to contact one of my state offices. May the coming year be a successful one for you, your family, your community, and our state.

Dear Friends,

2020 was a year unlike any in our lifetimes. Our state and nation dealt with unprecedented challenges--the coronavirus pandemic, ensuing economic fallout, and a prolonged, heavily divisive campaign season each took a significant toll on all of us. The worst part? In order to protect each other, we had to face these challenges in isolation. But a new year represents new possibilities; a chance to take stock of what we're grateful for and focus on the opportunities in front of us. As we reflect back on 2020, we will remember heartbreak and loss – but we cannot forget the shining rays of hope that broke through the darkness, reminding us all that better days are ahead.

Throughout the pandemic, my top focus has been on bridging the partisan divide in Washington in order to deliver desperately-needed relief for Maine people. Joined by colleagues last March, we pushed for bipartisan negotiations to produce a strong bill that helped fellow Mainers, businesses, and institutions weather this storm. In the weeks and months after the *CARES Act* passed, our team stayed in close contact with people throughout the state to determine how we should adjust our response to best support our citizens. Unfortunately, the aid provided by the *CARES Act* lapsed without Congressional action, leaving too many families and businesses in limbo. I never stopped pushing for a bipartisan relief bill and, after extensive negotiations, we ended the year on a good note by breaking the gridlock and passing new relief legislation. This new bill isn't perfect; in fact, it should just be the start our renewed response. As we enter 2021 with a new administration and new Congress, we must fight for additional legislation to help restore stability to our working families and rebuild our economy and public health infrastructure.

In the midst of this crisis, Congress did manage to accomplish a few successes that will outlast this awful pandemic. Among these was the *Great American Outdoors Act*, a bipartisan bill which was enacted into law in August 2020 and will help address a \$12 billion backlog at our national parks so future generations of Americans can enjoy these beautiful lands and create lifelong memories. Also, as we learn more about the recent hacks of our nation's networks, there is help on the way: 27 of the cybersecurity recommendations made by the Cyberspace Solarium Commission – which I co-chair with Republican Congressman Mike Gallagher– made it into this year's defense bill. While there is no guarantee that these provisions would have prevented the massive hack, they will certainly improve our cyber defenses.

Despite the challenges, I'm hopeful for the future. Vaccines are being distributed across our state – starting with our healthcare heroes, who have sacrificed so much throughout this unprecedented catastrophe and deserve our eternal gratitude. If there can be a silver lining from these challenges of 2020, maybe it will be this: I hope that, in the not-so distant future, we will be able to come together physically and we will be reminded of our love for each other. We have differences, without a doubt. But as Maine people stepped up to support each other, we saw again and again that our differences pale in comparison to the values we share. We are one state, and one community – and there is nothing we cannot or will not do for each other. Mary and I wish you a happy and healthy 2021. We can't wait to see you soon.

Dear Friends,

I hope this letter finds you safe and well. I know that this year has been challenging for many of our communities. In the midst of these challenges, it remains a privilege to represent you, and I appreciate the opportunity to update you on what I have been working on in Congress for the people of the Second Congressional District.

The coronavirus pandemic has made this year an especially difficult one. We've seen the struggles of small businesses, workers and families, hospitals, and states and towns. COVID-19 has been a serious threat to public health that requires a comprehensive, ongoing response. In March, Congress passed the largest of three bipartisan pieces of relief legislation, the *Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act*. The *CARES Act* was a \$2 trillion economic relief package to provide immediate assistance for some of those hit hardest by the pandemic. While an important start, many of the programs and benefits created by the *CARES Act* were set to expire by the end of 2020 at a time when COVID-19 cases were on the rise. That's why in late December, Congress passed another bipartisan bill to provide COVID-19 relief to small businesses and hospitals, the unemployed, and families struggling to put food on the table. However, the action Congress took at the end of 2020 cannot distract from its failure to act sooner. The unwillingness of many members of Congress to accept compromise throughout the fall left many Mainers struggling and led to a rushed process that produced a bill with serious flaws. In 2021, Congress needs to step up, come together, and lead the country through this pandemic and get our economy back on track.

There are a few bright spots that came out of the work done by Congress this year. As a member of the House Armed Services Committee, I helped advocate for a national defense bill that would include important priorities for American national security, Maine shipbuilders, and servicemembers and their families. The legislation authorizes a new DDG-51 Arleigh Burke-class destroyer to be constructed at Bath Iron Works and helps BIW compete for new work by encouraging a new multi-year procurement process for the DDG-51 Flight III. This funding bill also makes permanent new federal guidelines proposed by Senator King and me to allow Gold Star Families free admission to national parks and other federal lands.

I've been working to improve mental health services for veterans for years, and I led the Maine delegation's effort to address the need for long-term mental health substance abuse treatment for veterans in our state. This past fall the Veterans Administration announced we were successful. Construction starts next year on a new, 24-bed facility at Togus that will ensure Maine veterans won't be sent out of state to receive residential care for substance use disorder and associated mental health issues. This is one result that I am especially proud to deliver for my fellow Maine veterans.

As I reflect upon what I am most grateful for this year, I am especially glad to be able to share that my wife Izzy and I are expecting a baby in 2021. We are excited about this new addition to our family and look forward to the blessings ahead.

This period is challenging for Mainers as we all take steps to limit the spread of the coronavirus, protect our families and our communities, and lean on each other to withstand this pandemic and economic hardship. My staff and I stand ready to assist Mainers as we work through these challenges together. I look forward to continuing to work on your behalf in 2021.

Whether you have an issue with a business recovery grant, unemployment benefits, need to contact a state agency or just have a question or comment, don't hesitate to reach out. Dear Northport neighbors,

It's an honor to continue representing you in the Maine House of Representatives. This new legislative session looks quite different because of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. We were sworn in at the Augusta Civic Center, and much of our early work has taken place remotely, with both legislators and the public participating via the internet.

We are as determined as ever to continue to do the work you elected us to do. All our work is available to access online, either live or after the fact, and I encourage you to visit www.legislature.maine.gov if you are interested. I also hope you will feel free to contact me with any questions about how to stay informed about our proceedings.

A major part of our work this session is balancing the state budget for the next two years, and public hearings on this legislation are underway as of this writing. One of my goals for this budget includes making sure our recovery from the economic fallout of the pandemic leaves nobody behind. I will also be pushing to make sure the budget adequately funds our schools, strengthens our health care and behavioral health resources, provides help to local governments and property taxpayers and continues our efforts to address the climate crisis.

Another critical area of work will be our economy, particularly considering how difficult the pandemic has been for our working families and entrepreneurs. We will also need to continue to improve access to broadband, augment workforce training and invest in Maine's large infrastructure network. And, given the experience of so many constituents last year, we will need to address the serious shortcomings in our unemployment insurance system that were brought to light by the current situation.

My own bills include measures to increase the property tax exemption for veterans, to improve phone customer protections against robocalls and expand intensive case manager services at the Waldo Reentry Center.

Once again, I am serving on the Education and Cultural Affairs Committee, which oversees the state systems of education, along with the university and community college system, the Maine Arts Commission, Maine State Library, Maine State Museum and Maine Public Broadcasting Corporation.

Through both my committee work and other legislative business, I am committed to working with all my colleagues, regardless of party, to advocate for our community and move our state forward. Please contact me if I can be of any help to you and your family, or if you want to discuss any legislation. I fully welcome your questions and feedback.

Citizens of Waldo County,

The Members of the Waldo County Sheriff's Office are proud to serve the citizens of our great County. We want to thank the members of the public for their continued support. We are a full-service Sheriff's Office providing Law Enforcement, Corrections and Civil Paperwork Service to folks who live, work and visit Waldo County.

2020 was a year different from any other. The Covid-19 pandemic has made providing Law Enforcement and Corrections services very challenging. The killing of George Floyd in Minneapolis has impacted how our Nation views the Law Enforcement profession and how the services we provide will be delivered and regulated moving forward. Locally, we have continued to enhance our collaboration with the Knox County Sheriff's Office with a new inmate boarding agreement and further sharing of resources resulting in savings of hundreds of thousands of dollars to county taxpayers.

Our patrol division handled nearly 8,400 calls for service in 2020. These calls included all types of incidents from murders, domestic violence, robberies, burglaries, thefts, child abuse, sexual abuse, drug overdoses, and much more. The drug abuse epidemic continues to ravage our citizens and cause much of the crime in our county. The patrol division also conducted 1,491 traffic stops throughout the county in an effort to increase traffic safety on our roads and highways.

Our Corrections Division continues to excel in the operation of the Maine Coastal Regional Re-entry Center serving 46 residents in 2020. These are men who were nearing the end of their term of incarceration. Our many programs assist them with their integration back into society as productive and contributing citizens. During their stay at the re-entry center, residents provided 4,455 hours of community service throughout Waldo County. This translated to a savings in labor costs of \$53,461 to citizens and non-profit agencies. Residents also provided more than 173,000 pounds of fresh vegetables to local food pantries and those in need from the County's Garden Project overseen by Waldo County Commissioner William Shorey. The residents also paid \$8,928 dollars in room and board to the County.

The seventy-two-hour holding and booking facility processed 649 persons who were arrested in Waldo County by all the law enforcement agencies serving our County. If a person who has been arrested cannot make bail within 72 hours, he or she has to be transported to the Knox County Jail in Rockland by our Transport Division. Our average daily population of Waldo County prisoners held at the Knox County Jail was 21 men and women. This along with bringing prisoners to court and medical appointments, generated 310 transports with our transport division, traveling more than 50,000 miles in 2020.

Our Civil Service Division served 1,030 sets of legal paperwork all over the County in 2020.

It has been an honor for all of us to be of service to the citizens of Waldo County in 2020. We look forward to a safe and productive 2021.

Town Administrator Report

2020. What a year! As my Christmas ornaments I gave out said: 2020 Stink! Stank! Stunk! No one could have imagined the changes we all would face trying to navigate a pandemic. COVID19 brought about many changes in how we conducted business and provided services. The office was closed when the State of Emergency was declared by the Governor. We setup the phones so I could return calls or relay messages to the right people, as well as emails. A drop box was installed on the outside of the building so paperwork could be dropped off and then processed. We set up many services online so residents could do this from home. Those services are still available through the Town's website: www.northportmaine.org Plexiglas was installed at both clerk's windows for safety. We initially opened by appointment only, and then opened up for all while social distancing. Masks are still required.

Town Meeting and Municipal Elections were a challenge, but we got through it. Thank you for your patience and cooperation!! A special thank you to Amy Eldridge, Robin Coombs and Jeff Littlefield for answering questions and keeping the lines moving while disinfecting and practicing social distancing!! Town Meeting was held outside on the basketball court of the Drinkwater School and went so well we plan on holding this year's Town Meeting there again. (More to come on that as it draws closer.) A year later I believe we are heading in the right direction. The vaccine is available, restrictions are being eased, more schools are discussing in school learning and plans for in person gatherings cannot be far off. We've come a long way. Let's keep going in the right direction.

Last year's budget was extremely difficult to put together and this one has not been any easier. The Board has carefully reviewed each account several times, mindful of people still out of work and the lack luster economy. The plans for a new town office building remain on the back burner. However, this is something that will need to be addressed in the not too distant future. The building is old, not energy efficient, we have run out of storage space and the second floor is not structurally at its best. We have again cut back on projects. With voter approval we hope to reclaim and pave Rocky Road, a part of Beech Hill Road and a part of Priest Road. The Department of Transportation (DOT) will do work on Route 1 in Northport. Their plan is to start around Pound Hill Road and head north for about three miles doing drainage work. No word yet on when that will start, but we will let you know.

With so many families at home either out of work or working, or attending school, the lack of good internet service became more obvious than ever. The Board asked for volunteers and started a Northport Broadband Committee. This is a highly motived, dedicated group of people meeting with service providers and gathering all kinds of information. They will make a recommendation to the Selectmen on what they think is in the best interest of Northport regarding high speed internet. The goal of the Selectmen, and the Committee, is to have broadband available throughout Northport. This is not an easy task and will take time. The Committee has a link on the Town's website www.northportmaine.org with minutes, provider information and lots more.

We had a special election in April to complete the term of Selectman Zak Hollingshead, who unexpectedly moved. We were fortunate to have two residents step up and run for the position. Breanna Pinkham Bebb won the election and we welcome her to the Board of Selectmen. This marks the first time the Board is made up of all women! In other employee matters, Drexel Bailey stepped down as Transfer Station Attendant and Richie Taylor now holds that position. 2021 is my seventeenth year working for the Town and serving its residents. This will also be my last year as I plan to retire in early August. I came for a month to help out in the office, and just never left. Municipal work can be challenging, but it is certainly rewarding and I highly recommend it. Thank you Northport for giving me the opportunity to help guide the town in the direction voted on by its residents over the years. If I have accomplished anything it was with the help of all the Selectmen along the way and all our fantastic employees. The Selectmen serve with the idea they can help the Town and contribute to its growth, and I believe they have done that. The staff, as you know, are the best. They are dedicated, reliable, people who made my job so much easier. I couldn't have survived this long without them! We have tackled many issues over the years and have done so professionally, while managing to have some fun along the way! As I said, a great group of people I will truly miss!!

SUPERINENDENT'S LETTER

Dear Residents of Northport,

This has been an unparalleled year for us all. We were faced with a crisis that no one could have anticipated. The Drinkwater community worked diligently to provide the best and safest learning opportunities for your children. I couldn't be prouder of them! Our students and families were amazing and were appreciated each and every day!

In the midst of the pandemic we had several families move into the community, many of them with high school aged children. As a result, our tuition numbers for the 2021-2022 school year will increase by 43%. We have students attending five state approved high schools based on the school choice model. As a result of this increase in tuition, the cost of special education tuition for high needs students, and annual contractual obligations; this year's budget will reflect an increase of 4.87% to the taxpayers. We have worked diligently to keep the increase as low as possible. We have reduced a position at the Drinkwater School, we will be using Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) grant funds to cover the cost of a teaching position, and have applied available carryover monies and Maine PERS reserve funds. We have made every effort to bring to you the most fiscally responsible budget possible.

Although this has been a challenging year, we were able, with other grant monies, to complete some projects that will benefit our students for years to come. These grant monies had very limited usage and were not available to be used to supplant next year's budget. A few examples include: an outdoor learning center with the help of Taylor Made Construction, updated elementary bathrooms, and hand washing sinks in three elementary classroom (all other classes had them).

As we end our sixth school year, and look forward to the next, we appreciate all of the support the Northport community has always shown to our school and your students.

As always, I can't thank you enough for your continued support. The entire staff is privileged to work in a community that supports its school like you do. We are truly grateful.

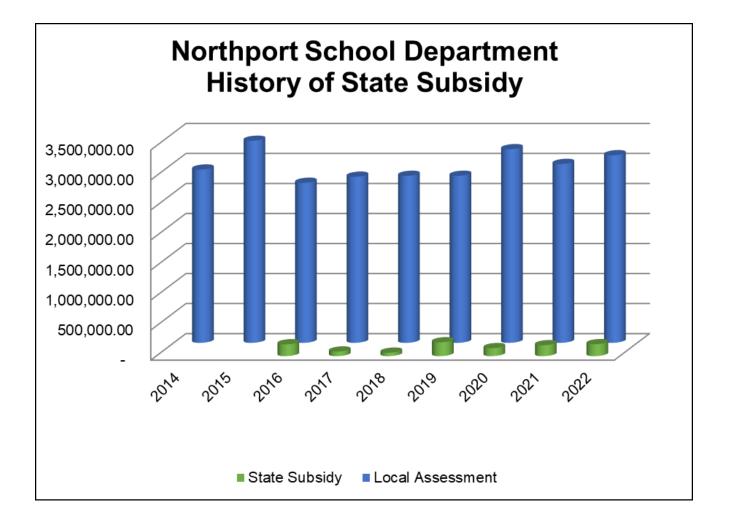

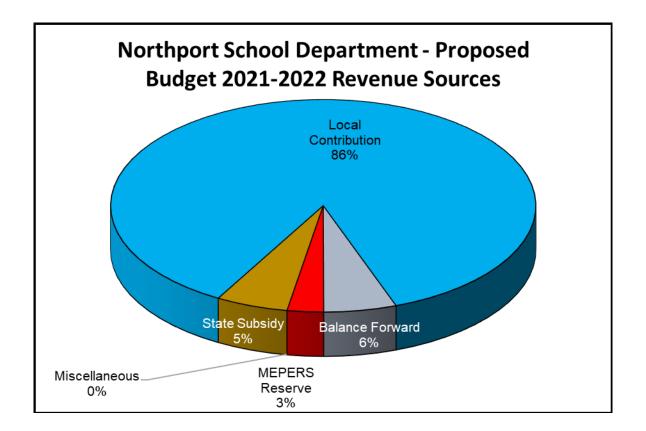

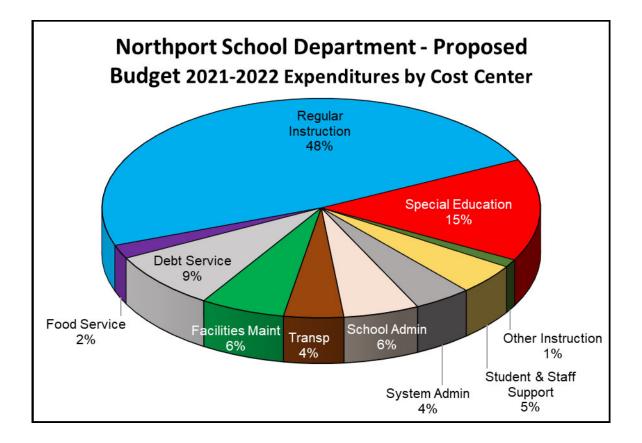

Northport Volunteer Fire

Department 2020 Annual report



I would like to thank the citizens of Northport for their continued support of this department during the past year. To say that this year was a challenge is definitely an understatement. The ongoing Covid-19 pandemic has created new challenges for us both in responding to calls for service and in trying to put together required trainings. The members of this department have taken these challenges in stride and were always there when they were needed.

With the ongoing pandemic, the men and women of this department still gave a total of 640 hours of their time answering calls and another 540 hours devoted to training, meetings and work details. Many people don't realize that this is still a volunteer department, although members receive a small hourly stipend while responding to calls or doing training, they all have full time jobs and family obligations and still make time to serve the people of this **community** in their time of need.

I want to remind people to call 911 immediately if you think you may have a fire. With modern building construction and furnishings, every second truly matters and can make the difference in being able to save a home. We would much rather respond to a call and not be needed than to be called too late. I would also like to remind people to change the batteries in their smoke detectors every year and if your smoke detector is over 10 years old, it should be replaced. Working smoke detectors have proven to save lives.

As a reminder, a permit is required for any open burning in the State of Maine. Permits may be obtained online free of charge at www.wardensreport.com or through the State of Maine Forest Service for a fee of \$7.00 at www.informe.org/burnpermit/public/index.html or at the town office. Generally permits are available after 5:00pm on weekdays and after 9:00am on weekends. As always, permit availability may be restricted due to weather conditions. Paper permits are also available at the town office or from the fire chief.

For the year, the fire department responded to a total of 83 calls broken down as follows:

Northport First Responders

2020 was a very trying year for Emergency Medical Services (EMS) as a whole and 2021 continues in the same path. As everyone can probably guess COVID-19 has driven major changes in the delivery of emergency medicine. The protocols that the first responders have to comply with was adjusted on an almost weekly basis as Maine struggled to find the safest and best method to treat potentially contagious patients with potentially contagious first responders. The proper personal protective equipment was debated and much of that was in short supply. The vaccine was just a hope in the far future at the start of 2020 and real facts about the disease were difficult to winnow out from anecdotes and misconceptions. COVID-19 is still not fully understood nor contained, but significant progress has been reported and I would like to think we can hope for a better year in 2021.

The Northport First Responders were called out over 85 times in 2020 for a multitude of problems. There seems at times to be a cycle of issues that we are called out for. Most recently, falls have been a common occurrence, but in 2020 the most common call was for a sick person, which probably should not be a surprise.

Northport Broadband Internet Committee

Created by the Northport Select Board in December 2020, the Northport Broadband Internet Committee (NBIC) has been meeting weekly starting February 9, 2021. The committee is working towards its stated goal of bringing reliable, affordable, high-speed internet service to every resident.

Its primary charge is to gather information and provide advice to the Select Board, including to:

* List availability and adequacy of current service offerings from communications providers in and around the area.

* Identify unserved and underserved locations in Northport.

* Evaluate pros and cons of various major models for broadband expansion, with estimates of cost and time required for each.

* Determine expertise needed to:

- Develop actionable plans for expanding broadband
- Outline resources necessary for successful applications for grant funding
- □ Find other means of financial support for broadband expansion.

* Seek opportunities for substantial financial support for broadband expansion resulting from current unprecedented state and federal funding of broadband infrastructure initiatives.

* Assess any actions the Town might take to further greater availability of high quality broadband to residents and businesses.

While Northport lags behind many of its neighbors in terms of adequate high-quality internet, we now have several new funding opportunities available to us. These prospects at both the federal and state levels are a once-in-a-generation opportunity to bring state-of-the-art broadband to every resident and business in Northport. Other funding models may speed the process, as well. We owe it to our community, our children, and the businesses that call Northport home, to make the most of this unique time. We ask your support for expansion of broadband in a manner as "future-proof" as we can possibly make it.

ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

Heidi J Blood here, I look forward to serving the Town of Northport as Animal Control Officer again this year and encourage all to contact me with any questions, complaints or concerns regarding Animal Control. I am also ACO for Lincolnville, Swanville and Liberty in addition to 3 Knox County towns. I live in Searsmont with an array of my own pets, including dogs, horses, chickens, cats and rabbits.

Just a few quick notes for you,

The Town of Northport currently has over 422 licensed dogs. And I'm happy to say that most were licensed in a timely manner this year. Your dog licensing fees support: State Humane Agents, Investigation of animal cruelty complaints and enforcement of animal welfare laws, Compliance with rabies vaccination of dogs and is vital in the return of lost dogs to their owners. Only \$1.00 per dog license stays within the town. The remainder is sent to Augusta to support the State of Maine Animal Welfare Program.

In 2020 I responded to more than 75 calls for assistance and traveled over 450 miles within the town. This is in addition to the countless calls, texts and emails from people seeking assistance or animal related resources.

The Town of Northport is contracted with PAWS Animal Shelter in Camden to take in our lost/stray animals that I pick up. So if your dog gets loose or your cat is found, and I cannot identify it, it gets delivered to the shelter for safe keeping until its owner can claim it. If your pet is micro chipped, I can scan it before going to the shelter in an attempt to get your pet back home to you. A fee must be paid to the shelter to claim your pet once it enters their care. If your dog is licensed and wearing its tags, I will make every effort to contact you and reunite you with your pet before delivering it to the shelter.

PAWS Animal Shelter will also take in your unwanted animals, but Animal Control will not handle it. YOU must call PAWS at 236-8702 and make arrangements to get the animal to them for relinquishing. This helps the shelter by asking you questions about the animals likes/dislikes etc. Ensuring that they are placed into an appropriate new home.

Dog licenses expire each year on December 31, regardless of when it was first done. You can renew your dog's license for the next year anytime after October 15. A state mandated Late fee of \$25.00 is applied starting February 1st. This is non negotiable as it is STATE law. You can renew your dog's license at the Town Office. Due to Covid-19 and the Governors continued State of Emergency, dog licensing and late fees have been extended to June 2nd, 2021.

It is Maine Law that every dog AND CAT be currently vaccinated against Rabies. If you are unsure of your pets vaccination status, call and ask the town office or your Veterinarian. Most vaccines are good for 3 years after a pets initial Rabies Vaccine which is only good for 1 year. Rabies is currently in every County of Maine, including Waldo and Knox County.

Animal Control does not generally handle wildlife complaints unless it is a wild animal that has come into contact with a domestic animal. I have live traps available for borrowing if your find yourself in need of trapping a nuisance animal. I also have several kennels and other equipment available.

I have asked the town administration to please review a suggested Animal Control Ordinance that has been enacted in several other towns that I work for. This ordinance has proven to be very effective in gaining voluntary compliance with many State Animal Welfare laws. In addition to voluntary compliance it has also been a very useful tool to issue fines for frequent violators of Maine Animal Law, again due to Covid it has been nearly impossible to issue court summons for Civil Animal law violations, as the courts are concentrating on criminal cases. Which leaves me with little to no recourse for frequent violators. I urge you to read over the suggested Ordinance and contact me with any questions or concerns.

Again, please do not hesitate to contact me with any questions, complaints or concerns regarding animals in Northport or Maine animal Laws.

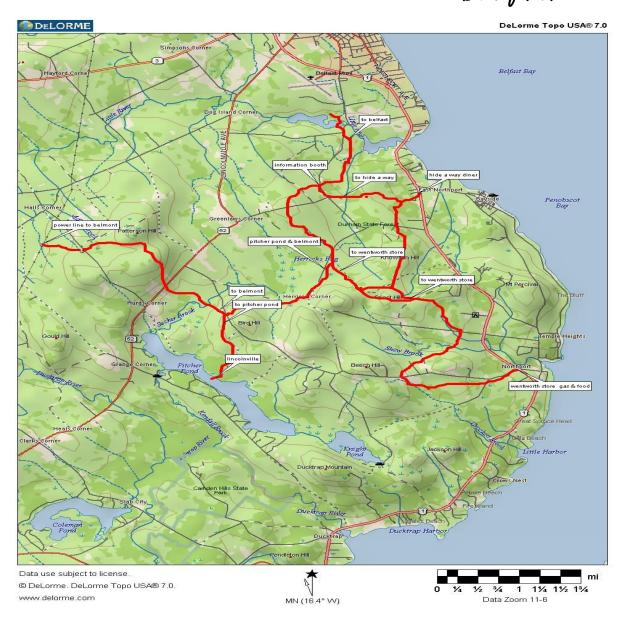
Northport Ridge Riders

In the name of the State of Maine, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of the Town of Northport in said County and State, qualified by law to vote in Town affairs to appear at the Northport Town Hall on Tuesday, July 14, 2020 at 8:00 a.m., there and then to act upon Articles 1 and 2 AND

To notify and warn said voters to meet at the Edna Drinkwater School on Thursday, July 16, 2020 at 7:00 p.m. there and then to act upon Articles 3 through 61 inclusive.

Article 1. To Choose a Moderator to preside at said Town Meeting.

Each year the Selectmen nominate someone for the Spirit of America Award, which encourages and recognizes those who volunteer. The individual must demonstrate a strong sense of community and volunteerism. This year the Spirit of American Award for 2019 is presented to Gordon Fuller, for his unselfish sense of community and giving to others.

Woodward proceeded to explain the process of the Town Meeting and both The Selectboard and the School board have determined multiple articles that could be combined. Combining the articles in bundles will decrease the time of the gathering due to COVID-19.

Hearing none, all in favor – none opposed.** Article passed. **ARTICLE 58.** In the event that the Northport School Department receives more state education subsidy than the amount included in its budget, shall the School Committee be authorized, in its discretion, to use all or part of the additional state subsidy to increase expenditures for school purposes in cost center categories approved by the School Committee, increase the allocation of finances in a reserve fund approved by the School Committee, and/or decrease the local cost share expectation, as defined in Title 20-A section 15671 A(1)(B), for local property taxpayers for funding public education as approved by the School Board?" *Motion was made and seconded to approve as written. Woodward called for questions & comments. Hearing none, all in favor – none opposed. Article passed.*

ARTICLE 59. Shall the School Committee be authorized to expend other sums as may be received from federal and state grants or programs or other sources during the fiscal year for school purposes, provided that such grants, programs or other sources do not require the expenditure of other funds not previously appropriated. *Motion was made and seconded to approve as written. Woodward called for questions & comments. Hearing none, all in favor – none opposed. Article passed.*

ARTICLE 60. Shall the School Committee be authorized to transfer an excess of 5% between cost centers, not to exceed the total spending allocation for the 2019-2020 school year, to balance accounts. *Motion was made and seconded to approve as written. Woodward called for questions & comments. Hearing none, all in favor – none opposed. Article passed.*

ARTICLE 61. In the event that the Northport School Department is informed of a curtailment of state education subsidy for 2020-2021, shall the School Committee be authorized, in its discretion, to utilize school fund balance to cover the subsidy curtailed by the State? *Motion was made and seconded to approve as written. Woodward called for questions & comments. Hearing none, all in favor – none opposed. Article passed.*

With no other articles to vote, on a Motion was made, and seconded, to adjourn at 7:57 p.m. All in favor- none opposed.

Independent Auditors' Report

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the Town of Northport, Maine, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2020, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Town's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditors' Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express opinions on these financial statements based on our audit. We did not audit the financial statements of the Northport School Department's general fund, fiduciary fund (agency fund - student activity accounts) and other governmental funds (special revenue funds), which represent 36%, 26%, and 61%, respectively, of the assets, fund balances/net position, and revenues of the Town of Northport, Maine. Those statements were audited by other auditors whose report has been furnished to us, and in our opinion, insofar as it relates to the amounts included for the general fund and other governmental funds, is based solely on the report of the other auditors. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. Those statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America by us and other auditors. In our opinion, based on our audit, the procedures described above, and the report of the other auditors, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.
